## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

This is the 150th year of our government under the constitution of 1789. That great document is still as it was when it was framed and still means what it meant at that time. 

Lady Macbeth (Marcella Haack) roams the house in her sleep and Mr. Hyde, of Jeckle and Hyde fame (Raymond Ponath), insists on boiling Wing in oil. Complications are prevented by an explanation by Dr. Bunn (David Blahnik) and the housekeeper, Mrs. Kluck(Dorothy Mueller) until Lucille Marcy, young and beautiful, (Geraldine Mahlik) captivates Don with her story of persecution by Doctor Bunn. Don falls slightly hard for Lucille when his former fiancee, Gertrude Finch (Louise Baumann) with her mother (Irmgard Toepel) and their colored maid Depression (Elaine Mraz), arrive.

More happens when Burke (Henry Runke) and a con wanted for murder (Junior Reince) contribute their share to the general uproar. Shots and screams were almost as numerous as the laughs produced when these and many other humorous situations presented themselves in "One Mad Night." The play was directed by Miss Marion Boedecker.

#### DRAMATICS CLASS PLAY



In the beginning of the year the freshmen gave a program for assembly in which they were dressed as little children in an amateur contest. By no means are the freshmen talents few or limited.


Now that we have worked hard to reach the first milestone of our journey we hope to keep up the good work until we become the honorary graduating class of 142.

Among the things which probably will be taken up for consideration are the sleigh-ride party, the money making scheme, and Come As Your Asked Valentine's Party.


A special meeting will be held at a later date to make out a schedule for the spring highlights, the annual Mother and Daughter Banquet and the Senior Farewell Party.



## KNIGHTS OF THE TEST TUBE



### FOOTBALL






