SENIOR CLASS PLAY

The laughter, rich lines, and the rollicking situations that occur make "Early to Bed--Early to Rise," the senior class play, an outstanding comedy. The play is a picture of the everyday life of the Fuller family. The entire three acts deal chiefly with the exploits of a young girl of about eleven, Patsy (Dorothy Krause), who spends a great deal of her time at the pet shop of an old German, Otto Kirschmeier (Owen Failey) and who is forever bringing home unwelcome pets--among them a skunk.

The love interest is supplied by Marion Fuller (Nadlie Ehlert) and her employer Jim Griggs (Ralph Feller). The smooth path of love, though, is upset when Laura (Clarice Bogdon), a very beautiful but fragile Southern girl begins to cling to Jim. Bobby (Donald Gordon) a typical American lad, indifferent to anything except the subject of cars, is kept busy trying to persuade his girl friend, Spanky (Agnes Piette), that they can't get married. Everitt Fuller, (James Schwedler), who is a mild, friendly, little man, is forever engaged in perfecting some current invention, his latest being a chicken feather picker. Abbie (Gertrude Cumber) a brisk, well-meaning spinster, is kept busy filling a mother's place.

Real excitement occurs when a young lady of the press, Daisy Fairfax (Caroline Serrahn)announces that Patsy is the winner of the "Cinderella House" In order to help Otto, who is being put out of business by Mr. Conkle (Clinton Halverson) and her sister, Patsy sells the house. Everything turns out for the best, making "Early to Bed--Early to Rise" a grand production. The play, which was presented June 7, was directed by Miss Marion Boedecker.

DRAMATICS CLASS PLAY



CLASS OF 1941


"Always be busy," seems to be the motto of this year's lively group of juniors. The apparent reason for this is that they are anxious to take part in every sport or activity offered by our high school.

Always keeping in mind the word "improvement" they earnestly strive to become 1941's outstanding graduates.



NEWS OF THE DAY



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

F.F.A. SPEAKING CONTEST



PERHAPS OUR BEST GAME


