MUSIC HOLDS SWAY AT A.H.S.

According to Mr. Leist, the band director, this year's band of sixty-four members has not been equaled in excellence for many years past.

Forty-five of the band members participated in the solo and ensemble tournament held at Shawano on March 29, 1941. A fine showing, of sixteen firsts, including four outstandings, thirteen seconds and three third places, was made. The non-competitive full band district festival was also held at Shawano on May 3, 1941. The band criticisms were exceptionally favorable.

The four outstanding events of the district music festival were entered in the National Tournament at St. Paul, Minnesota, May 15-17, 1941. The solos and ensembles entered included: piccolo solo, second rating, Sylvia Levin; bassoon solo, second rating, Colette Gerhart; tenor saxophone solo, third rating, Grace Sibilsky; quintet, third rating, Marion Naze, Colette Gerhart, Sylvia Levin, Betty Hruska, and Jeanne Zastrow.

The third annual spring concert was held on May 26, and the fourth annual Christmas concert was held on December 21, 1941.

THE CHURUS

Each year, as the choir raises its voices during its annual Christmas and Spring concerts, the audience continues to appreciate more and more the beauty of fine music. This year with a select personnel of sixty-four voices, the chorus is especially impressive. A very effective setting was worked out for the 1941 Christmas concert. 
FUTURE HOMEMAKERS

WOLVES DEFEAT OCONTO GRIDDERS FOR FIRST TIME IN HISTORY

This smashing victory, registered by the Wolves over Oconto, was the first in almost twenty years of gridiron clashes between the two teams. 






INTRAMURAL BASKETBALL


