SEASON OPENS WITH VICTORY 28-6

The Algoma Wolves opened the 1944 football season with an impressive victory over a small but spirited De Pere High team. The highlight of the game came when Seiler returned a kickoff seventy-five yards for a touchdown. DeDecker and Deprey turned on the heat in a fine display of hard running, while Slaby and Storm tossed the leather to Seiler for long gains. A safety made up for two tries after touchdowns that were missed. Although they were heavily outweighed the opponents forced over a touchdown in the third period of an otherwise one-sided game.

ALGOMA IN EASY WIN 27-0

Though reserve players saw almost as much action as the regulars, the Wolves had little trouble with the Oconto Falls Panthers. The game gave special interest to the folks at home because the WMAM station broadcasted a play by play account of the game. Points were accounted for by Deprey, Slaby, DeDecker and Storm with one safety and an extra point completing the scoring for the day. An alert pass defense turned several Panther threats to score.

WOLVES TAKE HOME TILT 35-0

Algoma held the tie for first place with Two Rivers by defeating the Blue Devils in the first home game of the season for the Wolves. Slaby, Qualman, Seiler and Blahnik accounted for all the scoring with DeDecker adding four extra points and Poehls one. Besides displaying skill in kicking extra points, DeDecker turned in a fine performance at the fullback spot. The greatest threat of the Blue Devils was their passing attack which, fortunately, was stopped short of the goal line.

ALGOMA AND BAYS IN STALEMATE 0-0

The Wolves winning streak was snapped at the end of three games as the underdog Bay team battled their way to a scoreless tie with the heavily lavored Wolves. It was a hard fought battle with the thrill of the game coming a few minutes after the opening kickoff, when Bud Poehls, Algoma halfback, cut through tackle and broke away for a brilliant fifty-five yard advance down to the Bay nine yard line. This threat, however, was stopped short of the goal by a hard charging Bay forward wall. The "Cherrylanders" used the raw, cold, windy weather to their advantage in stunning Algoma's offensive thrusts until late in the game when the Wolves moved up the field some sixty yards in a sustained drive only to lose the ball on a disheartening fumble in the last minutes of the game on the Bay nine yard line.

WOLVES DROP HOMECOMING GAME 25-0

In a game which decided who was to rule the conference the Two Rivers Air Patrol came through victorious. The invaders pushed across four touchdowns and held Algoma scoreless. Although playing a listless first half the Wolves dominated play in the last half, holding the opponents to a lone touchdown. The defensive play of Seiler, DeDecker and Deprey was outstanding for the Wolves.

ALGOMA LOSES THRILLER 6-0

Playing the hardest fought game of the season the Wolves dropped a close decision to the visiting Indians. The only touchdown of the game coming as a result of an Algoma fumble deep in Kewaunee territory. Victory was denied Algoma when Storm, late in the game, broke away and ran through the entire Kewaunee team and crossed the goal line, only to have the play recalled because of a clipping penalty on the five-yard line.

Ten seniors played their last game for the Wolves. Those who won't be back next year are: Slaby, Storm, Deprey, Vlies, Densow, Fulwiler, Iwen, Poehls, Pfuehler and Zimmerman.







JUNIOR PROM





April


- Tues. 3—We are back to school again after a restful Easter vacation.




