The club met every other Tuesday after school for the remainder of the term to discuss current topics. The members also became familiar with the rights of all Americans to voice their opinions because they realized that these


opinions greatly influence the developing of good citizenship.


and capture of the assassin.






ALGOMA 33- MARINETTE 30
















CALENDAR FOR 1945-46 September


