


PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

TO HAVE OR NOT TO HAVE—THAT IS THE QUESTION

THE DEBATE CLUB

The question for debate this year was, "Resolved: That the Federal Government should require arbitration in labor disputes in all basic American industries." Algoma entered the district forensics contest at Kimberly. Miss Nilles was director of the orations and extemporaneous speaking, while Mr. Herold and Mr. Badman handled the declamations.





The Indians flashed a deadly passing attack that kept the Wolves in a constant state of jitters. In the first quarter a fumble by Algoma gave Kewaunee the ball on the 20. Driving from here the Indians scored on a five yard buck by Cox. With the ball on the Wolves 10 yard line Kewaunee recovered another of our fumbles and Kostka, Kewaunee's ponderous fullback, plunged over to put Kewaunee in the lead 13-0. In the second half, still playing to win, Algoma drove to the Kewaunee 30. The Indians scored the last touchdown on a 40 yard drive with Barrette scoring to make the final tally 19-0.

DE PERE SCORES 12-7 VICTORY

All three of the game's touchdowns were scored in a busy first quarter as a determined De Pere team bested the Algoma Wolves 12-7. A fifty yard run by Bob Delain in the third quarter featured the only touchdown drive of the game. Taking the ball from the 2 yard line Delain plunged over. This was the last game for 12 senior lettermen: Jerabek, Zimmerman, Saxby, Zirbel, Wheeler, Reince, Hanson, Delain, Storm, Holtz, J. Groessl, and Vlies who is only a junior, but W.I.A.A. rules force him to drop out of competition next year.






