
ALGOMA 7 - TWO RIVERS 45





Algoma, after keeping a slim lead during the first half, came out with a big third quarter and held their own in the fourth to beat the Oconto Blue Devils 42-35. Kirchman scored 14 points.

WOLVES DOWN CHERRYLANDERS 42-36

The Wolves made it three straight victories by smashing the Bays 42-36. The victory put the Wolves in a tie for the number one spot in the conference, with Two Rivers being the only other team undefeated so far. 
