


PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE




FORENSICS




FUTURE HOMEMAKERS OF AMERICA

PEP CLUB


The Pep Club, under the direction of Miss Nancy Nelson, made a number of achievements this year. A point system was set up in order that active members could receive awards.


