





GRID RECORD IMPROVES FOOTBALL - 1952

This year's football team, having won four games, chalked up a good season. They could have been in on the championship scramble, but some bad breaks and the inability to score after sustained drives made the difference in the final outcome of the games.

Wolves who made the All-Conference team on defense were Ken Haack, a junior guard, and Don Meyer, a sophomore linebacker. Senior end Jerry Kulhanek made the offensive All-Conference team. Seniors Ken Meyer, a tackle, and Don Kossow, a halfback, sophomore quarterback John Cornell, and Ken Haack were given honorable mention on the offensive team. Defensive honorable mentions were Cornell at safety and Ronnie Dart at halfback.

The Wolves opened the '52-'53 campaign by losing to the Pulaski Red Raiders by a 26-12 score. Pulaski scored twice in the first half to take a 13-0 half time lead. Each team scored in the third quarter with Don Kossow scoring for Algoma. Both teams scored again in the final quarter. Quarterback John Cornell climaxed a 66 yard drive for Algoma.

On September 19th Algoma played the Gibraltar Vikings in a non-conference battle. The Wolves came out on top of the 13-6 score. The Algoma Wolves' first TD was scored on a pass from Cornell to Don Kossow. Kossow also accred the second Algoma touchdown on a one yard plunge. The defensive play of Bob Bathke, a linebacker, was outstanding.

At Oconto Falls the Wolves were downed by the score of 19-7. The teams played to a 7-7 first half deadlock. Algoma's touchdown came as halfback Don Kossow bulled his way over from the four yard line. The inability to score after several long drives was the main factor in the Algoma defeat.

A powerful Seymour team proved too much for the Algoma Wolves. Each team scored once in the first half with Deprey lugging the leather over for Algoma. Seymour took the lead in the third guarter and kept it from there on in. Algoma scored twice in the final period on a 20 yard dash by Don Kossow and a 13 yard pass from Cornell to Kossow. The final score was 25-19.

The homecoming spirit of Algoma was dulled as the Phantoms of West De Pere defeated the Wolves 25-0. The score was no indication of what kind of game it was. Three times long Algoma drives were stopped inside the De Pere 20. De Pere's first two touchdowns came on a 60 yard pass play and an 80 yard run.

The Wolves traveled to Minahan Stadium where they toppled the East De Pere Redbirds 25-6. The victory was well deserved as Algoma outplayed De Pere all the way. The win also showed fine improvement in the youthful Wolves. The Algoma attack was spearheaded by the running of halfbacks Clarence Deprey and Don Kossow. Kossow and Deprey each carried over two Algoma touchdowns.

The Wolves ruined Sturgeon Bay's homecoming by dumping the Bays by the score of 25-12. Halfbacks Kossow and Deprey each scored a TD for the Wolves in the first half. Sturgeon Bay also got two safeties in the first half to give Algoma an 18-6 half time lead. Algoma scored again in the final guarter as fullback Don Meyer battered his way over. Algoma, who was led by tackle Ken Haack, played its best defense game of the year.

The high spirited Algoma Wolves, playing their finest game of the season, upset their oldtime rival Kewaunee, 26-13. It was truly a great game and one to be long remembered. Algoma took a 6-0 halftime lead on a 13 yard dash by Don Meyer. Kewaunee tied the score, 6 all, early in the 3rd quarter. Each team exchanged scores once more with Kossow scampering 17 yards for the Algoma tally. The youthful Wolves refused to be out-done, though, as they scored twice more in the final quarter with Kossow and Cornell going over. Playing one of their best games of the young cage season, Algoma's basketeers came through with a 49-45 victory over Oconto Falls. The Wolves were behind at halftime 29-22 but went ahead in the third guarter for good. Kulhanek led Algoma's scoring with 14 points.

Trying to make it four in a row at Oconto the Wolves came out an the short end of the 65-41 score. Algoma stayed in the game for the first three quarters but in the final period the roof really fell in for the Wolves. Kulhanek netted 15 points for Algoma.

Made to appear sluggish by Pulaski's famed defensive tactics Algoma was fortunate to come out with a 37-33 verdict over the Red Raiders. Algoma's mistakes helped to keep Pulaski in the game.

Algoma, outlasting the Redbirds, went on to win their fifth Northeastern Wisconsin conference game 40-35 after a wobbly first half. De Pere romped to a 22-16 halftime lead, but in the second half the Wolves roared back to pull the game out of the fire.

Shooting at a remarkable 42 per cent from the floor the Indians defeated Algoma 45-34. The Wolves gave the Indians a good battle the first half with Kewaunee taking a 20-18 lead. In the second half Kewaunee "got hot" and went on to win the game,

To open the second round the Wolves tried to detect the West De Pere Phantoms by playing a possession game. The Wolves employed control tactics throughout, once holding the ball for four minutes during the second quarter, passing up all shooting opportunities. Algoma led 13-10 at the half, but lost in the final minutes, 26-22.

The Algoma Wolves were downed by a hot shooting Sturgeon Bay team. The first half was close, with the Bays coming out with a narrow margin, 23-21. Good shooting during the third quarter put the Bays in a 12 point lead, which the Wolves could not overcome. Guard Ken Meyer led Algoma with 13 points.

After a slow start, the Algoma Wolves picked up steam and went on to defeat Seymour 54-44. The performance was perhaps the best of the season for the local boys. Algoma led at halftime by a 22-19 score. Kulhanek led Algoma with 19 points.

Building up an early lead the Wolves outlasted Oconto Falls, 48-45. As against Seymour, the Wolves demonstrated a good brand of basketball. Algoma built up an eight point lead the first half as Oconto Falls chewed away at it the third and fourth quarters. Jerry Kulhanek paced the Wolves with 17 points.

In a game that was well played by both teams Algoma lost to Oconto 36-33. At the half the Blue Devils went ahead 19-18 on a lastsecond free throw. Dart was high scorer for Algoma with 9 points.

The Wolves rallied and took a 42-33 victory from Pulaski. The Red Raiders led 15-13 at the half. Don Meyer led the Wolves' rally in the last quarter by scoring 13 of his 19 points.

The Algoma Wolves turned back East De-Pere at De Pere by the score 51-48. The game was close throughout with Algoma taking a 23-17 halftime advantage. Cornell and Ken Meyer each plunked in 12 points for the Wolves.

In a typical Algoma-Kewaunee game the Wolves nipped the Indians by a 44-42 score. After a slow start the Wolves led 20-18 at the half. After a bad third guarter, the Wolves rallied to notch the victory. This gave the Wolves undisputed third place. Center Jerry Kulhanek led Algoma with 19 points.


