CHARGE DOWN THE FIELD AGAIN

The 1953 Algoma Wolves chalked up what is probably the best record in the history of the school. In winning six games, losing one, and tying one, the Wolves scored 203 points while holding the opposition to only 21 points. Algoma lost out on the championship by losing to an undefeated West De Pere eleven.

On Sept. 11, the Wolves traveled to Pulaski to open the season. They battled the rugged Raiders to a scoreless tie. Defense was the highlight of the game with the Wolves holding Pulaski on the five yard line, the only scoring threat of the game.

In a non-conference battle played at Algoma on Sept. 18, the Wolves downed the outmanned but game Vikings of Gibraltar. Algoma led at halftime 19-0 and the final score was 32 to 0. Cornell fired three touchdown passes, two to Ackerman and one to Meyer, and Deprey and Hein scored via the ground.

Algoma, playing one of its best games of the season, dumped the highly touted Oconto Falls Panthers by the score of 33 to 7. John Cornell passed for two touchdowns and ran for two more. Catching touchdown passes were Meyer and Dart, and Deprey bulled over from the three for the fifth touchdown. Highlight of the game was the outstanding defensive play of Don DeMeuse.

With reserves playing much of the game the Wolves dumped an inexperienced Seymour eleven 48 to 0 for their third victory of the campaign.

Algoma traveled to Minahan Stadium on October 9th, where they lost a hard fought 14-7 decision to the champion Phantoms of West De Pere. Scoring on two blocked punts, the Phantoms came from behind to salvage the victory. Algoma's touchdown was scored on a 57 yard runback of an intercepted pass by Ken Haack. This was the only touchdown scored against West all season.

Gaining the first homecoming victory in five years, the fired up Wolves blasted the De Pere Redbirds by the surprising score of 33 to 0. Touchdowns were scored by Deprey, who scored three times, also Cornell, and Meyer. Rick Kambach, Algoma's fine place kicker, converted after three of the touchdowns. Cornell did an outstanding job on pass defense, intercepting several passes.

Sturgeon Bay came to Algoma on Oct. 23 with intentions of an upset, but they were battered down by the Wolves to the tune of 29-0. Algoma led at halftime 22 to 0 on touchdowns by Meyer, Ackerman, and Deprey. The second half was much closer, Algoma getting its only touchdown on a plunge by Cornell. Ken Haack, senior tackle, was injured late in the game after playing an outstanding game.

In the final game of the season Algoma bowled over their old time rival, the Kewaunee Indians, 20 to 0. All of Algoma's touchdowns came on passes from Cornell. Two of them were long tosses to Ackerman and the other a short toss to Don Meyer. Reince, Kostichka, and Kambach stood out on defense in this hard fought game. It was the final game for six seniors and was a true team victory.

WOLVES TROUNCED, 60-40




