WOLVES COMPILE BEST RECORD IN HISTORY

With a record of seven victories and one defeat the 1954 football team gave A. H. S. one of its best seasons. The Wolves chalked up their first win by downing Antigo 20-19 in a non-conference tilt.

At Oconto Falls the team came out on top with a 7-0 victory at the expense of the Falls eleven. The only touchdown came in the third quarter on a two yard drive by Deprey. A satisfying victory was carried home by the Wolves in spite of the downpour of rain.

Algoma again proved powerful when it dealt out defeat to the Seymour squad by a score of 19-14. In the opening minutes of the game Dart scored on a pass play, giving Algoma an early lead. Seymour's TD tied the score in the second quarter. Cornell scored on a nine yard gallop and then threw to Meyer on a screen pass for the third touchdown.

The Wolves nearly upset the West De Pere team in the most interesting battle of the season. Our boys jumped off to a 13-0 half time lead only to be tied in the early minutes of the third quarter. West won the game 18-13.

In the finest team effort of the season the Wolves overcame an early 7-0 deficit to administer a 35-7 trouncing to the East De Pere Redbirds. Cornell and Meyer scored the first two Algoma tallies with two yard plunges after De Pere scored on a blocked punt. Dart scored two TD's, one on an intercepted pass and one on a pass from Cornell.

Algoma really rolled over the Oconto Bluedevils

in the Homecoming tilt held at Algoma. All Algoma backs scored as the Wolves moved to an easy 40-6 win over the torn Devils.

The Wolves ruined Sturgeon Bay's Homecoming by dumping the Bays by the score of 34-0. The five TDs came on pass plays from Cornell to each of the following receivers: Dart 3, Deprey 1, and Het-tiger 1. Backs Meyer and Deprey played one of the finest games of their career at the Bay by literally reeling off the yardage.

For the third straight time Algoma defeated the Kewaunee Indians in one of the hardest fought battles ever to come out of the rivalry between the two squads. Bernie Wendricks, handicapped with a severely cut lip, played the best defensive game of his football career. Final score was 25-20.

The 1954 team also set an offensive record by compiling 2984 yards by running, passing, punt returns, kickoff returns and pass interceptions.

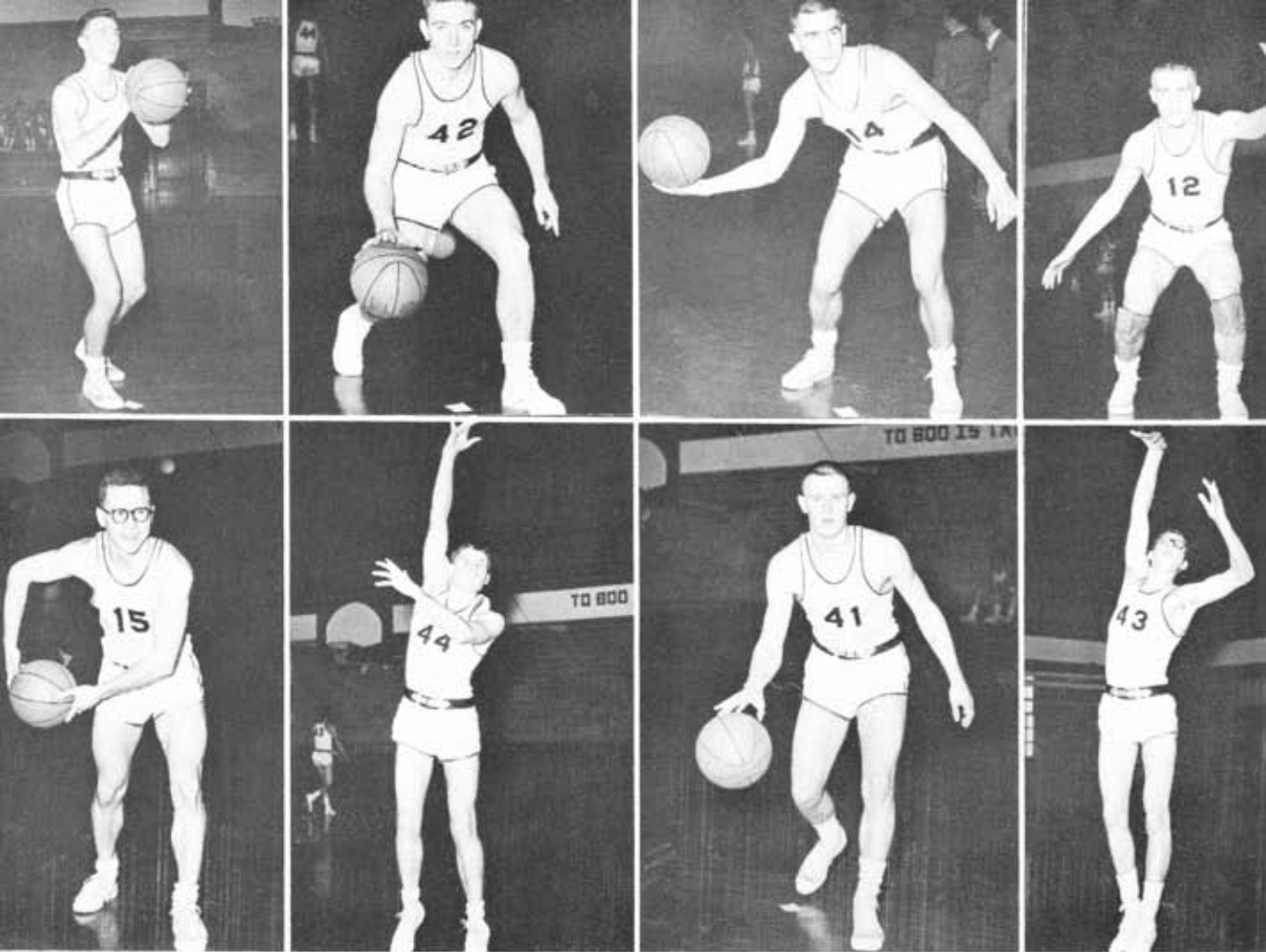

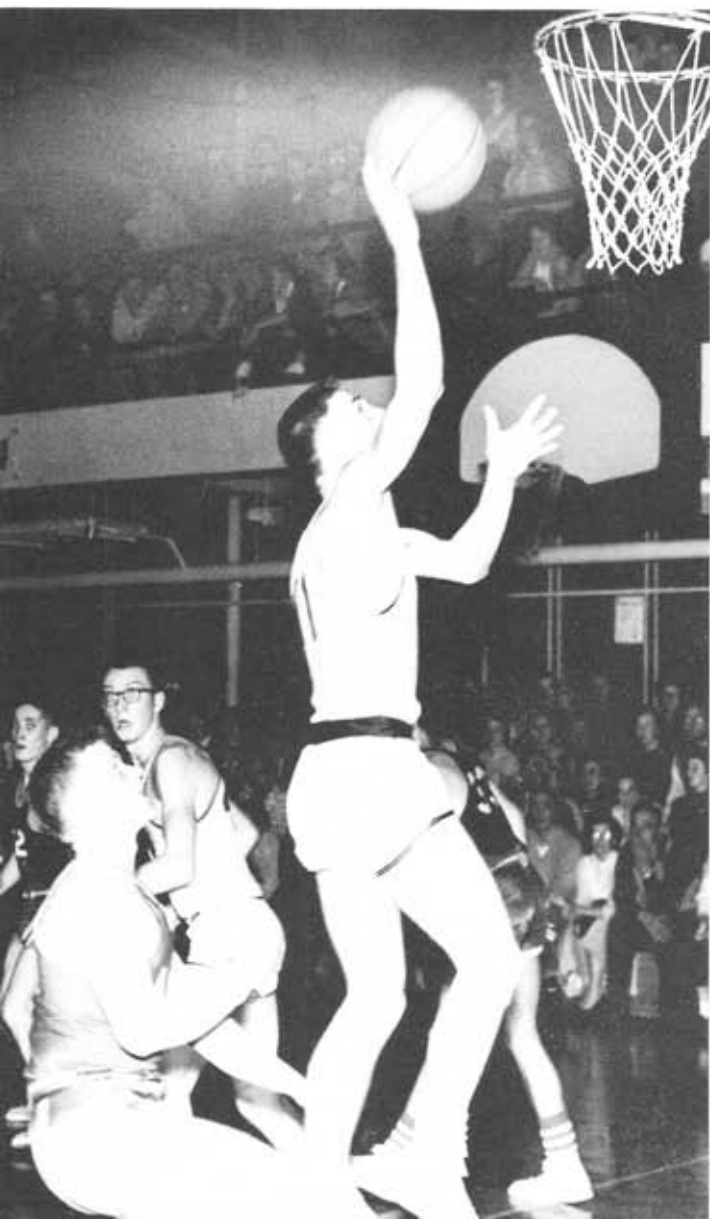
