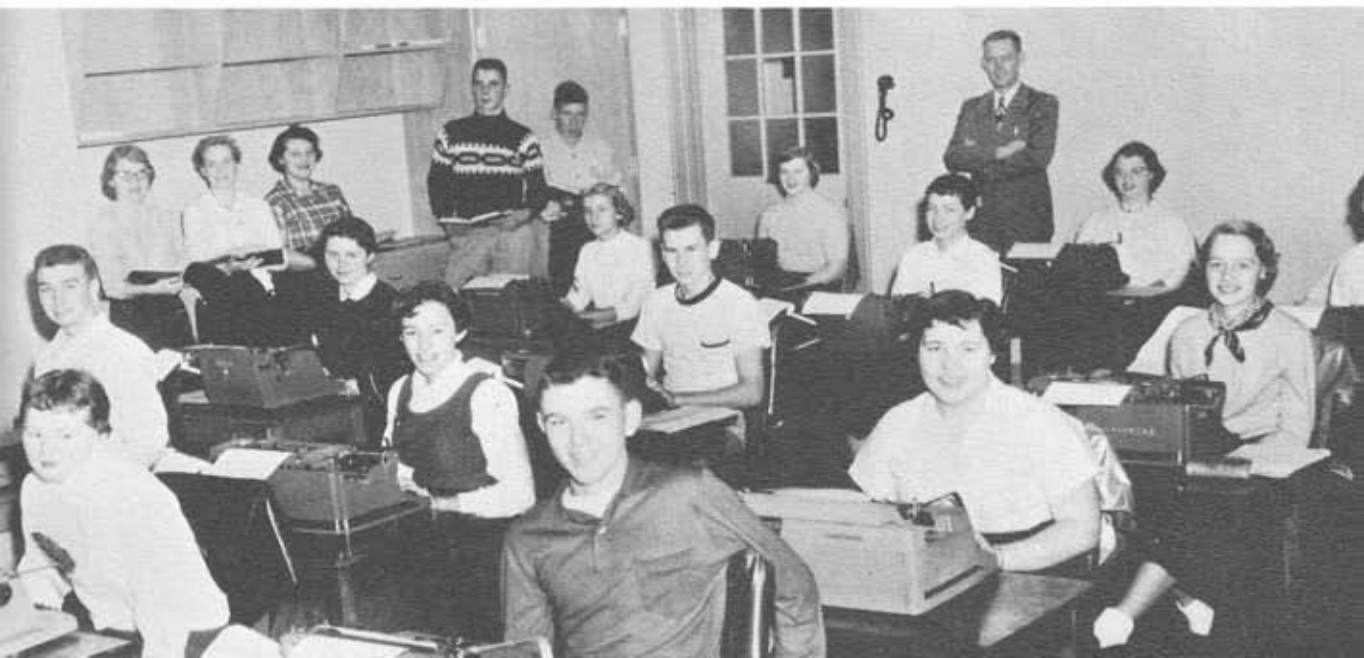

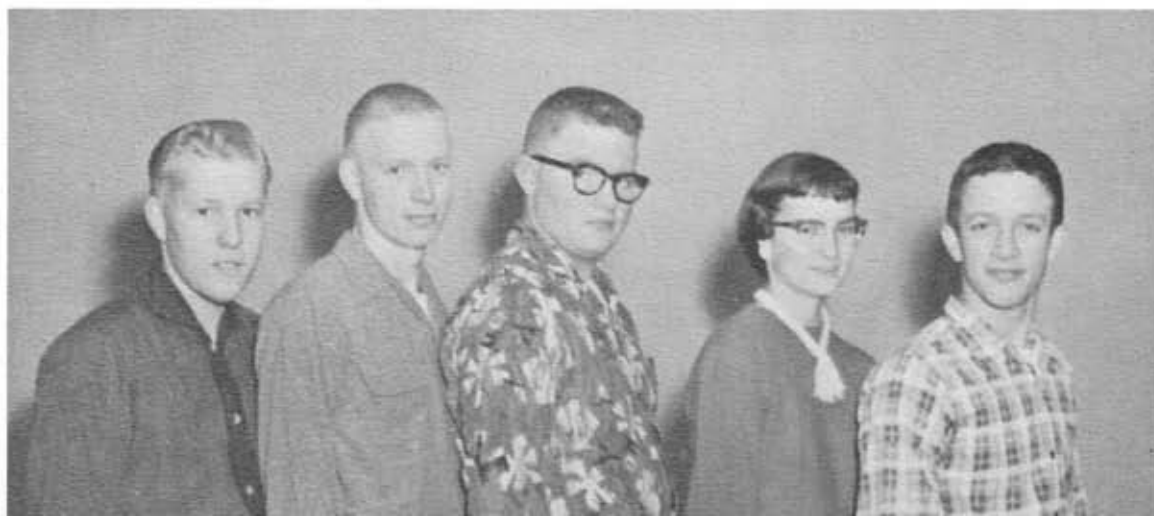
DEBATE

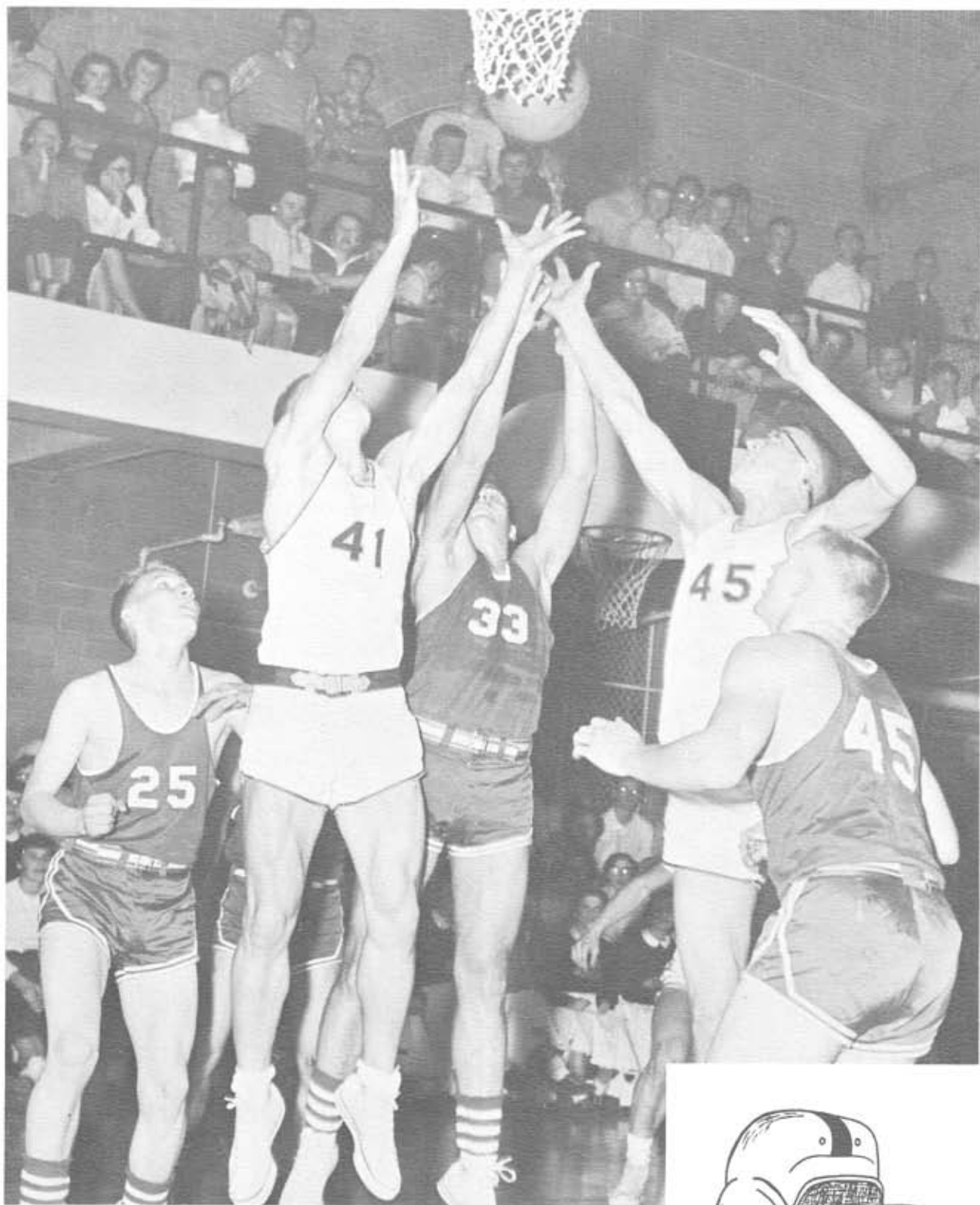

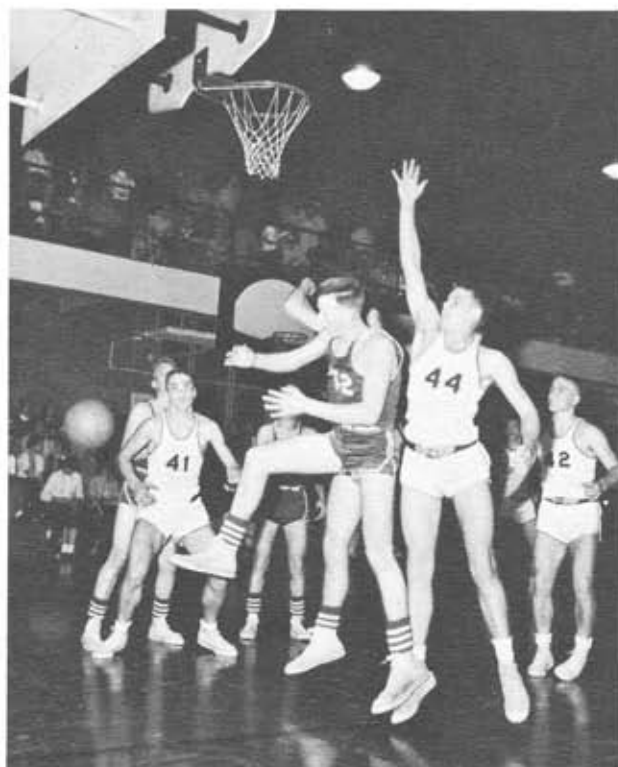
OCONTO FALLS NUDGES ALGOMA

WOLVES DEFEAT CLIPPERS

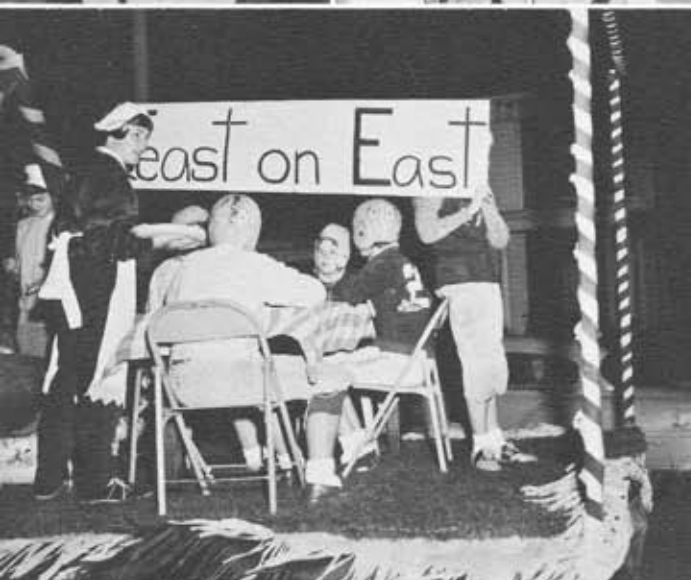

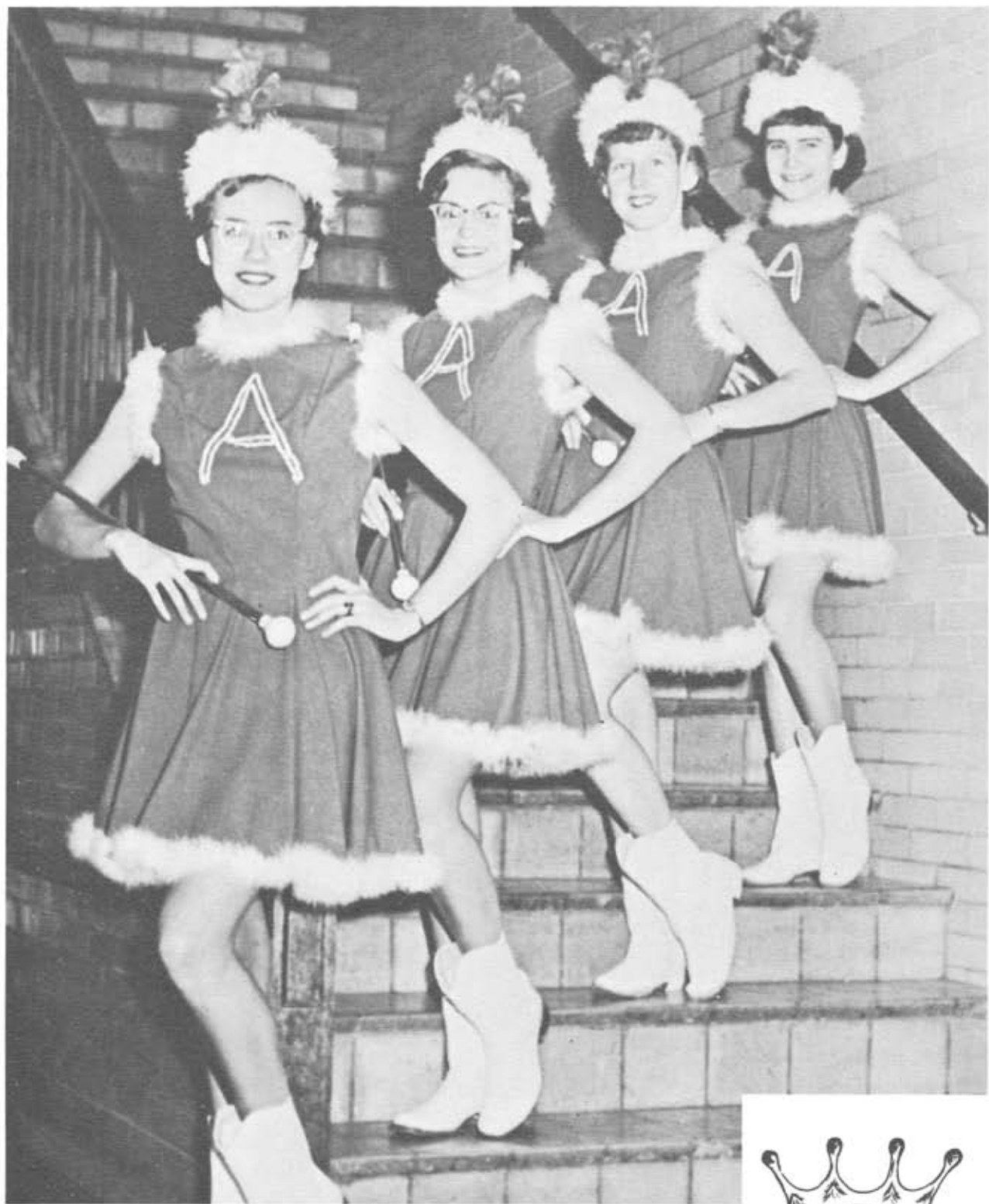

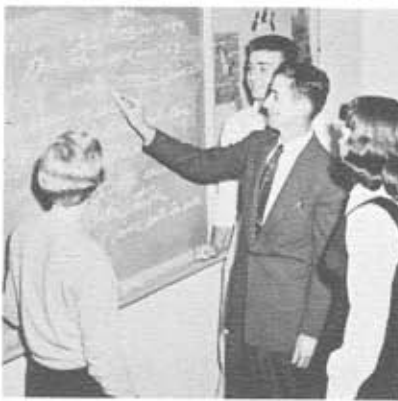
